We've been wearing a lot of masks lately. We have masks waiting at our desks, in our cars, on the coat rack at home. We put masks on to get groceries, to see family from afar, to spend time outside. Some of us don hospital masks – plain, but protective. Others have fashion masks – decorative and safe. Still others make a statement with their masks – boldly declaring "I can't breathe" written in sharpie.

As we put on these masks to protect ourselves against COVID-19, our country is trying, once again, to take off the suffocating mask of racism and white supremacy. Brionna Taylor, Ahmaud Arbery, and George Floyd are just three Black people who have been killed by the hands of their White neighbors and police officers because of fear and prejudice. Dreadfully, these are just three people in a long history of racist brutality and violence in America. As a nation, we must do better. As a predominately White denomination, we must do better. As a predominately White congregation in a predominately White community, we must do better.

Like the guards on Calvary, our congregation stands at the foot of the cross in this unique moment in history. Will we confront the fear of taking off our mask of White privilege? Will we beckon the call that God has for our lives to gracefully be and act outside of our masks? Or will we continue to serve the sour wine of injustice?

Lauren and I felt called to move here and join this beautiful community of faith because we sensed that you are a glimpse of what the Beloved Community will be like. We visited at the tailend of the Bridging the Racial Divide art project with Lansing Church of God in Christ, in which you transformed your masks into deeply meaningful art that symbolized racial healing in the midst of Christian relationship. I felt confident knowing that I could be true to my call as a husband to a Black woman and as a pastor because you have started the emotionally intensive work of confronting racism and taking off the mask of White privilege.

Exactly a year after the Pentecost arts festival with LCOGIC, our hearts continue to burn for racial justice as we grapple with our individual and communal role in a society that values White skin over Black and Brown skin. At every session meeting, we talk about our "dream status". One of our dreams is to be a "totally inclusive church that welcomes and celebrates every race, culture, sexual orientation and socio-economic status." Friends, it's time to dive ever deeper into turning that dream into reality.

On Thursday night, our session called a meeting to do just that. Our leaders decided to take a public stand against racism and committed to leading the congregation in untangling our White privilege. We committed to do this through worship, education, and action:

- Worship: We will have artwork from Bridging the Racial Divide in our sanctuary during Ordinary Time of the lectionary year to symbolize the ways this extraordinary moment requires faithful action in our daily lives. Additionally, we will be reciting the Belhar Confession as a response to the Word during Ordinary Time.
- Education: The session has committed to doing their own education and reflection upon racism and White privilege this summer as we determine congregation-wide educational events. Some of these events could include an in-depth study of the Belhar confession, having an outside organization facilitate conversations on racism, and organizing an event for parents about how to talk to their children about race.
- Action: On the church's sign at the corner of Aurelius and Holt roads, we will
 declare "All Lives CANNOT Matter Until Black Lives Matter." Additionally, a
 sub-committee of the session will be writing a public statement against
 racism, the first of its kind for the session. Inspired by our worship and
 educational efforts, a Racial Justice sub-committee of the Witness
 committee has been created to champion our efforts and advocacy for racial
 justice.

I'm challenged by Maya Angelou: "Do the best you can until you know better. Then when you know better, do better." I'm grateful to be part a community of God's faithful that burns to do better. Will you join us as we do the painfully internal, relational, and deeply spiritual work of racial justice that God is calling us to do right now?

NORMAL IS A MOVING TARGET

At a Called Session meeting on June 4, our elders officially moved FPC-Holt into Stage 1 of the homecoming (our plan for re-opening) which is concurrent with Michigan's Phase 4. As you can see below, we'll have a few changes to make in our ministries and building use.

Please note that the door at the Aurelius Road entrance will now be open from 9am to 4pm on Tuesday-Friday (the office remains closed on Mondays) and forms are available to fill out each time you enter the building (touchless thermometers will be at hand to help you answer the temperature question). The Homecoming Taskforce continues its work and will propose Stage 2 to session at the June meeting.

- live stream status quo
- Continued suspension of in-person weddings and funerals

Ministry

- Whenever together as church (on-site or off):
 - o maintain social distancing
 - o Whenever two or more are gathered...mask!
 - Kirk and Ben will not wear masks during preaching or leading worship, but during all other social interaction.
- No carpooling
- No overnight retreats/camps
- In-person, acute pastoral care resumes for pastors (as safety allows)
- · Building Use
 - o Our "Caring Community Covenant"
 - Limit group gatherings as much as possible. If necessary to gather, the fewest number of individuals should be present, but no more than 10
 - Upon entrance, fill out Ingham County Health Department checklist
 - Signs posted on the doors with Ingham County Checklist
 - Protocols, forms and touchless thermometers provided inside
 - Whenever two or more are gathered...mask! Anyone entering the building must wear a mask when in the presence of others (available for any who need)
 - Maintain 6 foot social distancing
 - Sanitize touch points before and after use of an area (sanitizing stations located throughout building)
 - o Open to ministries of the church if possible to adhere by Caring Community Covenant (for example):
 - Blood drives
 - Food distribution
 - Preparation for food distribution (advent house)
 - o All meetings remain on zoom
 - o No outside events (i.e. Jazzercise, square dancing, showers/parties)
- Office
 - o Full functioning by virtual means
 - T-F, 9-noon/1-4
 - o In-person: by appointment only

We pray for the senior class of 2020. May your grace be sufficient during these strange and chaotic days. At FPC-Holt, you can join in the response to the coronavirus is several ways:


- 1. Our mask-makers have passed the 1600 mark! They're providing masks to essential and non-essential personal and now are maintaining a supply for all the visitors to our building!

- 3. Our lunch bag brigade is ongoing on Tuesdays when we've committed to provide 40-50 simple sack lunches to the homeless in downtown Lansing. Put together a few lunches at home and then drop off your contributions at the church on Tuesdays between 11am and 1pm.











Normally that involves cooking and serving a group breakfast in the Fellowship Hall and a celebration for everyone together. This year though, Anita cooked up her normal breakfast smorgasbord and made a few home deliveries with some co-conspirators who like to spread joy too.

For Anita, it's part of the satisfaction of serving in Christian education year-after-year — growing alongside each class of kids and helping to guide their path from infants to young adulthood.

For us, it's a chance to say "thank you Anita for your generous heart of gold.

Fruits of the Spirit – Kindness

Galatians 5:22 "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control"

Memory Verse: Ephesians 4:32 "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another as God in Christ has forgiven you."

Thoughts: "Kindness" is defined as the quality of being friendly, generous, and considerate --and not expecting anything in return. Our culture encourages us to do "random acts of kindness" with studies showing that by doing good things for others, we have a profound sense of well-being. Marriage experts find that kindness in marriage is the most important predictor of satisfaction and stability. A central part of Biblical kindness is the act of forgiveness. "For you, O Lord, are good and forgiving, abounding in steadfast love to all who call on you." (Psalm 86:5) Inside of any loving relationship is the need to be able to forgive and reconcile with each other. God sets the example for us and expects us to follow. "Bear with one another, and if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other, just as the Lord has forgiven you, so you also must forgive." Remember that being a kind and forgiving person also means being kind and asking forgiveness for yourself.

Challenge: Memorize Ephesians 4:3: "Be kind to one another, tenderhearted, forgiving one another as God in Christ has forgiven you." Look for ways to practice kindness. Notice when there is a need that you can fill. Greet others with a smile, kind words, courtesy. Give honest compliments, send a note of appreciation, refuse to gossip. Pray for others. And forgive those who have wronged you in word or deed or neglect.

Prayer: Oh Faithful Lord, you are the giver of life, author of my being, and you love me more than I can ever understand. Give me the heart and the insight to be kind to the people you place in my path. Energize me with affirmations in my spirit as I spread your love in my

Ideas for implementing the Mustard Seed Challenge and making it work in your life:

- When memorizing the verse, go at your own pace. Write it on a sticky note and put it where you will see it daily. Break it into segments. Repetition is the key. Give yourself time and grace.
- Begin a Mustard Seed Journal where you write the memory verse and what you discover about yourself as you
 implement it in your life. Set some reasonable goals for yourself in order to meet the challenge and record your journey
 of growth.
- Ask someone to do the challenge with you as a prayer and accountability partner. Share with each other the challenges that you have as you implement the Bible verse into your daily life. Encourage and pray for each other.
- Begin with smaller goals like creating certain time segments where you concentrate on the challenge; then add more time segments. Or concentrate on how you think about one certain area (like yourself) first – then expand it to other areas of your life.

Seeking a pastoral call during a pandemic

Candidates, search committees get creative while learning more about one another

LOUISVILLE— When Teresa Larson first learned that her graduation from Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary (https://www.lpts.edu/) would be virtual, she did what she was trained to do.

She thought theologically.


"I knew it was coming, but it still didn't soften the blow," Larson said of the seminary's digital commencement ceremony, which was held on May 16. "I couldn't shake the disappointment of my family not being there, but one of my biggest learnings from COVID-19 has been how to hold that deep disappointment alongside the joy. Those can exist side by side."

This same hard-won knowledge continues to inform Larson as she navigates the uncharted waters of seeking a call during a global pandemic.

As a former teacher and an alumna of the Presbyterian Mission Agency's Young Adult Volunteer program

(https://www.presbyterianmission.org/ministries/yav/), Larson was already well ahead of the game when it came to communicating her gifts for ministry in a virtual world.

"I had the idea of building my own website even before the pandemic struck," she said. "Creating the bare bones of an online portfolio was not only part of my teacher's education but it was also a seminary assignment in our practical theology class. When I started to apply for ministry positions, I thought it would be a good idea to include the link to my website as part of my PIF [Personal Information Form] so that committee members could watch my video sermons and get to know me a little more."

Already in conversation with several associate pastor nominating committees [APNCs], Larson, a candidate under care of the Presbytery of Lake Michigan (https://lakemichiganpresbytery.org/), soon discovered that her prior preparation served her well as the natural, next steps in the call process necessarily stalled as a result of travel and other restrictions related to the pandemic.

"The day I had to cancel those reservations was a frightening day," she recalled. "It didn't take long, though, for APNCs and me to begin working together to figure out how to faithfully move forward, and how to continue the process over virtual platforms."

Larson added that the pandemic has also changed the nature of some of the questions that she poses to search committees.

"As churches consider their identity and call in light of COVID-19, there will be transformations," she said. "I'm asking churches what they are doing in response, and what they are learning about themselves along the way."

In the meantime, Larson is grateful to the pastoral staff and the leadership of Second Presbyterian Church (https://www.2ndpreslou.org/) in Louisville, which has extended her term there as seminary intern on a full-time basis until she receives a call.

"Being welcomed as a full member of the team is a gift I cannot repay," she said. "After we made the move to live-streaming our worship, I have had the opportunity to join the team every week to reflect on what we did and what we could do differently with the video, sound, lighting and more to have the experience better translate to congregants."

Larson's most recent challenge was to preach her Sunday sermon to an empty sanctuary.

"Preaching is never a craft where you're done learning," she said. "The current crisis has refreshed my own theology of proclamation and how to care for others in ways that feel unfamiliar. I have no doubt this will serve me wherever I'm called to serve, especially since my

first few months likely won't look like what I expect. It's a new reality, with a steep learning curve, that I am ready to take on."


